Services for Dr. Leroy J. Olson, emeritus professor of microbiology at the UTMB, will be held on Tuesday, October 24, 2006, at 1:30 p.m. at Lloyd James Funeral Chapel in Tyler with Pastor Mark Braaten officiating. Burial will follow at Tyler Memorial Park Cemetery. He

passed away on October 21, 2006, in Tyler.

Dr. Olson was born on May 28, 1926 in Fargo, North Dakota. He received a bachelor's degree in biology-chemistry from Concordia College in Minnesota in 1950, a master's degree in veterinary parasitology from Kansas State University Graduate School and a PhD in medical parasitology-basic medical science from UTMB Graduate School in 1957.

Dr. Olson was associated with UTMB for 45 years. He began as a research assistant and served as a full professor for many years until his retirement in 1998. At his retirement he was serving as coordinator of the Medical Microbiology course.

He was a member of the American Society of Microbiology, American Society of Parasitologists, American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Southwest Association of Parasitologists where he served as president in 1972.

Dr. Olson is survived by his wife 0f 53 years, Donna Doran Olson of Tyler; sons, Eric Olson MD of Midland, Stephen Olson of California, Martin Olson of Tyler; daughters-in-law, Julie K. Olson and Anna Quarton Olson and 4 grandchildren.


Brown Bag Seminar

Friends of Concordia Congregation:

It pleases me that you are interested in the Islamic world and have asked me to come and teach a series of classes. I believe it is extremely important for us to know something about the Muslim world because of the current crisis arising out of terrorism in the Middle East and elsewhere and hundreds of Muslims in the greater Fargo-Moorhead area. My interest in the subject was heightened after 9-11 when I sought answers to the question, "Why do the radicals hate us so?" My goal in these classes is to help you understand who and what we are dealing with. It is not, however, to create a climate of defensiveness and hostility. It is my hope that all of you will take advantage of this opportunity and I will try my best to keep it interesting and informative. I use all sorts of drawings, pictures and charts with an overhead projector as well as handouts you can take home with you.

Please understand, you are not expected to know anything about the Muslim world, nor will you be quizzed or asked to comment unless you choose to do so. Bring you

curiosity! We want everyone to be comfortable and eager to learn.

100th Anniversary of Telelaget

The earliest members of Concordia were part of a settlement of Norwegians from the Fyrsedal district of Telemark county in

Norway. Around the turn of the 20th Century, Norwegians started forming community organizations (*bygdelags*) to stay in touch and pass along the culture of their local areas of Norway.

Concordia's Pastor Bendik Bondahl was the driving force in organizing a bygdelag for Telemark. He was elected Telelaget's first president at their organizing meeting in Fargo on January 16, 1907. Among the charter members were Concordia parishioners Aadne Breiland, S. B. Salveson, Leif Thortvedt, Knut Midgarden, and A. O. Kragnes.

Telelaget's first historian, Torkel Oftlie, offered this account:

Just before Christmas in 1906 a cry was sent out for some Telers to start a Telelag ... We held a meeting in a hall in Fargo, January 16, 1907 ... Pastor Bondal read a constitution for Telelaget endorsed by Bondal, H. H. Aaker, Torkel Oftelie, S. B. Salverson, Leif Tortvedt, A. O. Kragnes, A. H. Breiland, Knut Midgard and A. K. Tveito. This draft was adopted. Pastor Bondal was elected Chairman, A. A. Trovatten, Vice Chairman, S. B. Salverson, Secretary, and Torkel Oftlie, Soga writer.

Reverend Bondahl was Telelaget president and a relatively young man when he died in 1908. He is buried in Concordia's church yard. Two of the earliest issues of the group's publication, the *Telesoga*, included stories and biographies of the Telers who lived in the "Buffalo River Settlement."
